Course Description:

This course introduces the basic techniques and equipment used in pre-production and production of making a low budget independent movie. Some of the techniques that we study will be universal to most films. Students will work together in groups to bring an existing script to a finished digital video short. In addition, we will look at theoretical and historical aspects of filmmaking.

Required Text:

There is no required text book. We will review online content, as well as printed hand outs. There will be assigned reading most weeks. We will have have group discussions and projects based on the reading or viewing of films.

Course Learning Objectives:

- 1. Work together on a group film production.
- 2. Demonstrate how to use an SLR camera along with other cameras such as an HVX.
- 3. Demonstrate basic lighting techniques for a variety of situations.
- 4. Understand how to use audio equipment to record good dialogue.
- 5. Assist in creating a short script and a storyboard.
- 6. Describe how to analyze and compose a shot.
- 7. Demonstrate an understanding for theories of cinematography.
- 8. Demonstrate an understanding for theories of film editing.
- 9. Use editing software and techniques. Distribute final work in a variety of formats.
- 10. Demonstrate an understanding of some key historical aspects of film production.
- 11. Use appropriate languages of film when describing and analyzing a scene.

Grading:

Assignments will be directly related to production of the film. They may also include

writing, story boarding, meetings, and production.

Journal: 100 points

You will have journal entries about once a week. There will be about 10 total entries.

Quizzes: 200 points

There will be three quizzes during the quarter.
